

At our last two Division One meetings, we discussed a new project for the NCR: establishing names for our Divisions. A dozen or so names were suggested that were associated with our area, history, and image. The list is currently posted on the Division One website for you to review prior to our meeting at 7 PM next Friday, March 18. The link to that page is http:// www.divisiononencr.com/division.html. Throughout the discussion, I've had a favorite that I cannot get out of my mind, so I'm going to propose not only a name, but a logo and some applications. The criteria that I considered include symbolic association with our area history, geographical association, an element of "fun", limited colors to simplify printing, no fine detail or halftones, and flexibility for imprinting clothing, models, mugs, etc. The design you see [on the next page] provides the heron as a visual symbol of the Black Swamp and the couplers provide a railroad icon that carries over from our old logo as well as the old NMRA logo. Here the couplers also signify the outreach of our Division: we are the connection between members and the NMRA. The boxcar mockup shows what we could do with decal sets. We could have a limited number of decals produced that members could purchase inexpensively. Not only could we then build Division One cars for our own layouts, we could make up a few cars to be used as appreciation gifts for guests, contest awards, etc. If other NCR Divisions picked up on the decal idea, you could wind up with a North Central Region string of 10 cars! My point in all this is not only to propose a design to get the discussion off-center, but also to stimulate thought toward creative things we can do with a new identity. So think about this proposal and put on your thinking caps. This is going to be an important item on Friday's agenda, so let's see if we can come together with a plan.

We've got a lot of good stuff on our plate for Friday. Gary Chudzinski is going to demonstrate an automated track module that includes a number of electronic products and operating ideas. Ray Huber will present a new circuit he's been working on and show its layout applications. And we will continue our series of mini-clinics related to operations with a presentation by Norm Cattell on prototype switching practices. As always, we are counting on YOU to bring your projects for Show'n'Tell, Pics'n'Flics, and Tools'n'Techniques. I look forward to every Division One meeting because I know I'm going to learn some new things that will directly impact my modeling efforts. That can only continue if we all pitch in and contribute. Even if you've got an "old" idea, remember that folks come and go, so run it by us again!

I rode my bike to Vulcan interchange when I was 13 and took this picture of the Toledo Angola & Western caboose #828. Vulcan was named for a long gone foundry, also where the New York Central Old Road crossed the Terminal by the University of Toledo. Vulcan at one time had an interlocking tower when the Toledo & Indiana interurban also crossed and interchanged at Dorr Street for a total of 4 railroads interchanging. At this point in time there was a sign that said Vulcan, an abandoned outhouse and a small wood coal bunker left over from the tower and a pile of old railroad ties. In interurban days, the Toledo & Indiana took hundreds of coal hoppers yearly from the Terminal and NYC to the many greenhouses that were along Dorr Street to the West before 1940.


The TA&W was still very busy for a 10 mile short line and the crew included the conductor, just standing up, and several brakemen. It was a really hot day and they had taken a break in the shade of the caboose waiting for the Terminal to deliver a cut of cars. The caboose was a former DL&W one and still wore the number from the Lackawanna. TA&W had several wood cabooses and this one replaced a worn out one about 1950. The Lackawanna liked splash shields on the railings to keep wheels from throwing water and ice on the platform. Interestingly the last TA&W steam locomotive survives and is on display in Wheeling, West Virginia.

The Detroit & Mackinac hopper is also a long vanished item. I came back with color film several times later hoping to get a photo of the green caboose but never saw it again, the crew all piled into the Alco diesel cab after this time. As it turns out, somebody had set fire to the caboose at Silica and burned it out to the steel bracing. Later after Medusa Cement donated the entire line to an excursion line, they got a former Toledo Terminal (C&O) caboose which is now on display in Sylvania, Ohio along with the T&I (T&W) electric locomotive. Medusa had spent about \$100,000 in legal in legal fees trying to abandon the TA&W and decided donating the entire line to the excursion operation including the working Alco diesel switcher was a better bet than spending hundreds of thousands more in legal fees which might be more than the scrap value when they were all done. During both steam and diesel days, the Toledo Terminal shop took care of rebuilding and servicing the TA&W locomotives and would loan a TTRR loco when needed. The TA&W right of way is now the University/ Parks Trail bike way going about 6 miles to King road.


Shame on me, but I failed to get the troop number so I could give them credit for this very interesting contest. I finally got it to work but, it was <u>no walk through the park</u>.




