View from the Cab April 2018

In last month's column, I described my efforts to learn how to design parts for 3D printing. After studying free Sketchup software I went through a lot of trial and error designing a sprue of 50 custom potato barrels for modeling the Maine potato distribution industry. At press time in March I had placed my first 3D printing order online at Shapeways.com and was anxiously awaiting the Brown Truck of Happiness to make the delivery. Finally, the bundle of joy graced my front porch and I was not disappointed by the results! The parts came out with great detail. The only issue was their size: after working so long on full-screen drawings, I had lost perspective regarding how small they actually were in HO scale. And I'll need a bunch more to produce a half dozen truckloads of 40 barrels each. But all in all, the experience was rewarding and I immediately started my second project. I designed two parts to improve installation of Tortoise switch machines. The first is a guide for marking the mounting position and the second is the mount itself, which is designed to attach easily with two screws and then the Tortoise snaps into the mount. If you've ever wrestled with a Tortoise trying to properly place mounting holes and then screwing it down through the crowded flange holes, you'll know what I was trying to fix! For these new parts, I discovered the 3D printing services of my local library and they really took care of business. They ran my prototype parts quickly, accurately, and cheap enough to make sense for all my future Tortoise installations. Now I've improved the design even further to include installation of an operating switch stand on either side of the switch. I plan to put together a demo installation and then tell you all about it at one of our upcoming meetings. Through this process I've learned two things that really stimulate my model railroad ambitions. First, I can now produce parts to model things that are not commercially available. And second, I can CREATE parts to DO things in ways that are not commercially available. About six weeks have passed since I first started learning Sketchup, and I find myself "doodling" with it all the time and I'm amazed at how quickly ideas take shape. I heartily recommend this process and encourage you to check it out yourself.

As much fun as I've had with my 3D parts, I've not neglected my layout and this month I made some significant progress on my first scene. I built and installed about three dozen trees featuring Fall foliage blending into a five foot backdrop. I tried a lot of techniques and materials, along with some ideas of my own, and I'll tell you all about it at this month's Black Swamp Division meeting (Friday, April 27, 7 PM). For more info about our meeting activities, check out Norm Cattell's column elsewhere in the TO. Also don't miss this meeting because we're going to talk more about our Summer outing plans!

From the Editor's Desk



Here's something from Al Grigsby we're all facing, like it or not!

Twenty-five Years of Model Railroading.

It really all started 70 years ago when I got a Lionel train for Christmas. The ping pong table was confiscated and many hours of fun for many years until girls and career took precedence. When my oldest son was 9, I decided he needed to learn about soldering and trains. I traded in the "olde" 027 for the more popular HO stuff and got a new ping pong table. We had a ball following "How to Build a Rail Road" and soon had [a] two train operation. A few years later my second son helped me complete the scenery.

In 1992 we built a retirement home with the vision of a large layout in the basement. Kevin Endriss and Mike Finkler helped me plan and build the new empire, the "Seneca and Scioto Rail Road". An Erie subdivision that ran between Portsmouth Ohio and Toledo with a Pennsylvania RR interchange. Some of you may remember several articles about building the layout that were published in the monthly Division 1 newsletter.

Well here we are over 25 years after the move and we are moving again. What am I going to do with 3 rooms of scenic-ed railroad, many engines, hundreds of cars, bridges, buildings, etc? Here is my story of how I scaled down.


I felt I had some well built structures and upgraded rolling stock that I wanted to let the local modelers have first shot at buying. Ray Huber published my letter and the open house brought many to see what I had. I used the layout for tables to display my goods, which worked out well. About a third of my stuff was going to new homes. (I wish I would have had another weekend sale but time was a problem.)

I put as many cars and locomotives in their original boxes as possible. (I wish I hadn't thrown out so many boxes.) I carefully removed structures and turnouts so they could be reused if possible. It took several weeks as I tried to recover as much as I could. Then came the dismantling of the scenery and bench work. A sabre saw and a drill with screw bit did the job. It was one section at a time. About 1000 screws later I had a pile of "L"girder beam and joists for sale or fuel for the backyard fire-pit. (It seems a shame to burn up several hundred dollars worth of lumber when a new layout could use it. Anyone interested?) I also had a dozen 55 gallon sized contractor garbage bags of rubble. I found out that my garbage collector would take 5 extra bags for only \$8. Hum, problem solved!

Now that the layout was gone I had to get the train room repaired and time was running short. I had painted the scenery directly onto the dry wall and I had several holes or tunnels through the walls into staging and loops. I hired some help to plaster the holes and paint so the next tenant can have a proper space. What a relief when that was done. However I still had several large plastic boxes full of rolling stock, turnouts, DCC stuff and unsold structures. The plan was to sell as much as I could at the train and toy flea market at Owens. That was a good decision as I was able to sell almost another third of my inventory.

What am I going to do with the rest? Fortunately I have 6 grandsons, some of which are interested in having a keepsake from Grandpa. I plan to box up a small train for each with the hope that they too will get the bug and keep our wonderful hobby going. I've also had success using E-bay to sell stuff at a decent price. In the future I will continue to use on-line sales and maybe another flea market. I still have all my tools as I hope to be able to build models in the future.


