




That was the beginning of what a lot of us are today and that's "hooked" on a hobby that has fostered more lasting friendships, provided more learning experiences and drained our wallets dry.

#### Maumee Express Convention 2014 Update by: Fred Lux

Express 2014 Progress update and meeting minutes December 8, 2013

The convention planning committee met Sunday, December 8. In addition to the committee members, Chuck White from Division 3 was there to talk about the possibility of holding a silent auction similar to what was done in Troy last month. Also in attendance were Bill Gawthrop and Tim Moran representing the Free-Mo group.

Bill and Tim had layout diagrams for the modular setup at our convention. The setup will utilize all of ballroom #4. Logistics for setup and teardown, as well as viewing and ops sessions were discussed at length.

Chuck White gave a detailed report on the silent auction process and the background behind the concept. The board discussed Chuck's proposal and looked for ways to implement the silent auction. The upshot of the discussion was that while it was a good idea and a possible money maker, no one on the committee was sure that the necessary additional space was available at the Ramada Convention Center. Fred is going to meet with Jennifer to see if anything can be worked out.

Bill Gawthrop brought three boxes of supplies for us to use that were left over from the 2013 NCR convention in Troy. Thanks, Bill.

Dave McMullian brought in a detailed grid showing a possible way to organize all of the convention activities so that participants could get the most out of it. The grid layout allows both attendees and participants to maximize their convention weekend. Dave also talked about logistics for the NCR membership meeting Sunday morning and the NCR board meeting on Friday morning.

Steve Kellogg reported on his process of procuring door prizes and provided a verbal list of what companies have already responded with donations.

Jeff Schumaker reported that response from modular groups had been very good and that he now had filled all four ballrooms with layouts. He had one large S-scale modular layout that he did not have room for, and had to turn away.


Jerry Sahagian reported that he had received two convention registrations so far. Jerry is going to handle data entry into a spreadsheet and pass the checks on to Phil.

We discussed the fact that the electronic registration feature of the convention web site was not going to be ready in time to roll out to the public. Paul was going to continue work on it and he and Jerry would test it out with hopes of having it ready for the 2015 NCR convention. One major component that was still lacking was a way to handle e-commerce so that the entire process could be done on line. The informational side of the convention web site is up and running, although Paul is still looking for more data to flesh it out.

The next committee meeting will be held in mid-January, with a specific date set after the first of the year.
